Have you ever set out on a trip with guided instructions, only to lose your way?

Noah Santillan has. In the December 2016 edition of Outside Online, David Kushner chronicles Noah's story: the adventure of an American in Iceland who gets far more than he bargains for when, seeking adventure, he books a recreational trip to a country he'd never visited.

Santillan flew into the airport at Keflavik, Iceland, rented a car and was then on his way toward his hotel in Reykjavik. He had turned on the car's GPS and was confident that within 45 minutes he would reach his destination. An hour passed, though, and to his dismay the GPS said that he still had 8 hours to go before he reached his destination. So he reentered the destination address into the GPS, but got the same results. He figured something was wrong but decided that the GPS knew Iceland better than he did and that his best bet was to just follow it.

Eventually, however...there were almost no cars on the road. And those roads got much icier. When the GPS took him along a mountain road with a steep cliff face and his tires skidded dangerously over the ice, Noah finally gave in to the conclusion that he was most certainly not on the right path. Noah was lost.

This is where the story gets truly interesting. Noah winds up in a fishing village and immediately one of the locals understands what happened: his hotel was on "Laugavegur" Road but Expedia had erroneously added an extra "r" to the road name, making it "Laugarvegur," a road which was in another corner of the country. Noah fortunately finds lodging nearby, but the story gets even better. This is so amusing for the locals that they post it all over social media. When Noah wakes up the next morning, he finds that he is the newest celebrity in Iceland. The country is captivated by his story. He eventually makes his way to Reykjavik, and everyone knows who he is. Everyone wants his picture. He is given free food, free drink, free lodging, and makes an abundance of new friends. He wanted adventure and he most certainly – though in a completely unexpected way – found it.

I am not the first - or even the thousandth - pastor to make use of GPS in a sermon or a column. But I, like many others, found Noah's story truly entertaining. Instead of trusting his own God-given gifts of vision and common sense, Noah relied on a GPS device – a machine – to direct him in achieving his goal. And, wonder of wonders, it worked out beautifully for him.

Noah was lucky. Most times, however, we are not so fortunate when we ignore what our hearts are telling us. Similarly, when we suspect that God is directing us one way but instead choose a different path – relying upon the less-reliable roadmap – we wind up in places far away from where God wants us to go. When we think we know the way better than God, we will inevitably wind up straying so far from the path that it may become difficult to find our way back to the road. And the brambles in which we are caught can be painful.

Jesus was fully human and fully God. He knew that he was on the road to the cross, but do you think the human nature of Jesus had the desire to be nailed to a tree? Of course not. Read and internalize the words of Luke 22:42: "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done."

What if Jesus the Son had followed his human GPS and run away from that which God the Father willed for him? It would not only have changed the course of history, but it would have changed the fate of humankind. Without the death and the resurrection, salvation would not be ours.

During this season of Lent which is nearly upon us, remember the road that Jesus walked. Remember the trials that he encountered in the wilderness and how he resisted the devil. Remember how, even when he knew the horrible death that awaited him, he still followed divine GPS in favor of human GPS and marched straight toward his fate while faithfully trusting God.

If you want to honor the savior that sacrificed himself for you, may you rely upon the more accurate GPS available to you. As you walk with Jesus (you are *never* alone!), hold his hand tightly and in prayer listen for what God is saying. When you feel God calling you in a certain direction, go there. Do not allow your human nature GPS to take you down a path that gets in the way of what your God - who loves you and will always know best for you - has in store.

The Presbytery has increased the amount of Per Capita that is due from each member in 2018. Per Capita provides administrative support to the mission of the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly.
