Theo was sick on Christmas Eve morning, but he improved later in the day and was well enough to travel by evening. So I (foolishly) thought everything was fine. But my 15-month old had "awry" on his mind, and in the middle of some evening milk decided to decorate

our guest bedroom at my parents' house with all sorts of brightly colored projectiles. Mieke cleaned Theo and, armed with a healthy dose of water, vinegar and towels, I dutifully mopped up the bedroom. Theo soon improved and all would be well for Christmas!

...and it mostly was. But the next day wore on and Theo again deteriorated and got a little dehydrated. So Mieke worried and I then worried about both of them. Finally, though, Theo drank and returned to normal. I had visions of sugar plums floating through the air, and I could see myself being delicately lowered by cherubs into a soft chair, my legs and torso warmly wrapped in blankets of cashmere...

But then Mieke got sick. And stayed sick. For days.

In an effort to speed this column up I will spare you details of the scene that ensued. Suffice it to say, the Christmas – New Year's Eve "break" that I was expecting was anything but.

A funny thing happened on the way to 2019, though. I received a wonderful gift that I never asked for and certainly did not see coming. I got to see how much my wife does for my son and for me.

Mieke and I typically split the household duties, chores, Theo stuff, everything. I like to think we have a pretty good system, and I have an academic understanding of what she does on a daily and weekly basis. But, as is true with so many things in this world, an academic understanding of something is no serviceable substitute for actually experiencing it. We cannot know what it's like to fly in an airplane until we do it. We cannot understand what a strawberry tastes like until it's actually crossed our lips.

So I did all the work, from chores to errands to Theo stuff to everything else. I was physically and emotionally exhausted. And so was Mieke; her sickness had robbed her of every ounce of strength. Amazingly, though, every night she *still* put Theo to bed (Theo won't let Daddy; he demands Mommy). *This is no small task*. Theo fights sleep like no child I have ever known. It's painstakingly slow and tedious work. Not an undertaking for the fainthearted. Yet she did this for us *every single night*.

And thus I was gifted with a profoundly deeper understanding of how much Mieke loves Theo and me. I didn't think it possible, but I love her even more now than I did a week ago.

If we all took the time to look at Christmas and at the birth of Jesus with fresh eyes and open hearts, maybe we, too would have a "profoundly deeper understanding" of how much God loves us. Too long we have all taken for granted that wonderful gift that God gave us in the Messiah. We now all have a future and we will experience salvation because of the original Christmas gift. Why do we try to substitute so many other things for the perfection that was already graciously given? We have *already* unwrapped the perfect gift. We waste our lives when we engage in a fruitless search for something else to fill the void that forms when Jesus is pushed aside.

And so I will say again what I said at church this past Sunday: Christmas has passed, and the world is going to run away from Santa. There is no need for the *Christian* to run away from *Christ*. Even when there is no greenery present, no holly on the mantle, no snow falling outside the window...I pray that you will still treasure in your hearts the love that God showed all of us in the gift of Jesus.




